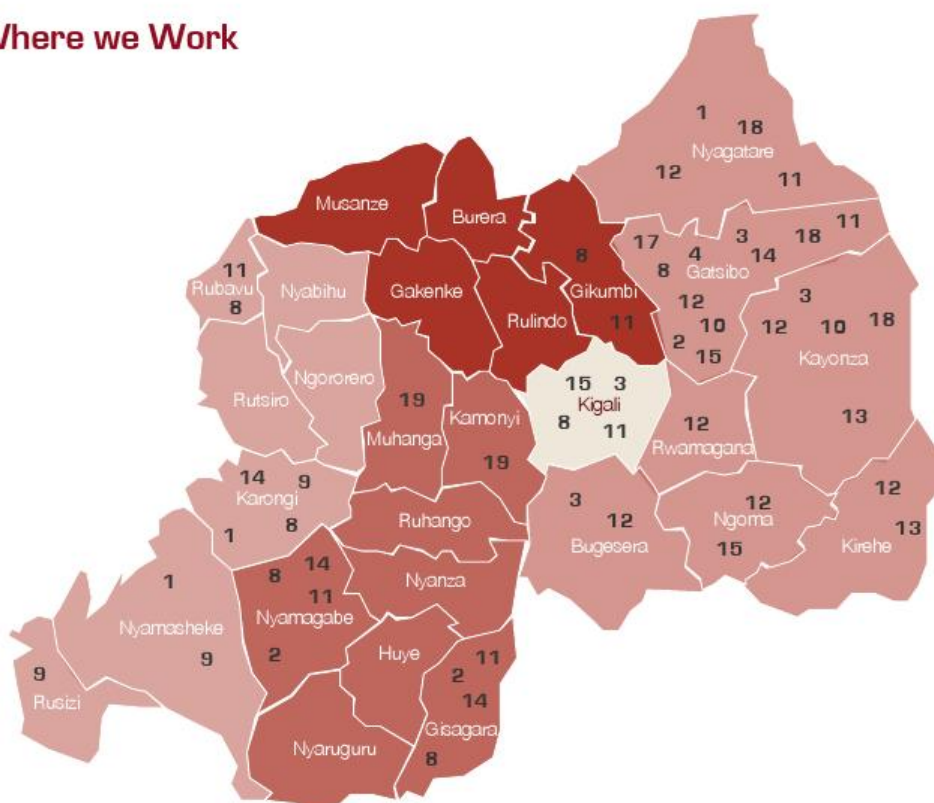

SUCCESS STORY

A Daily Balanced Diet

When Mukangwije Marie, 48 Years old, resident of Nyamasheke District, learned that ASC Program is organizing a vegetable kitchen gardening training for CBG members, she requested her CBG to be one of its representatives in the training.

After the training she put in place a kitchen garden (green vegetables). As a result, she has a daily balanced diet for her family, and the rest, she sells vegetables in the nearest market. This money helps her to improve the family livelihood. She pays medical insurance for six family members and meets school requirements for her children. Local leaders and health center visited her vegetable garden and she was identified as a model vegetable farmer in the sector. The health center uses her garden as learning site for the mothers who have malnourished children. When Nyamasheke district evaluated all the vegetable growers in the sector, she was ranked the best farmer and she was rewarded with a cow. This cow enables her to get manure for vegetable garden, increases the productivity and the earnings in terms of money.

PROGRAM SUMMARY

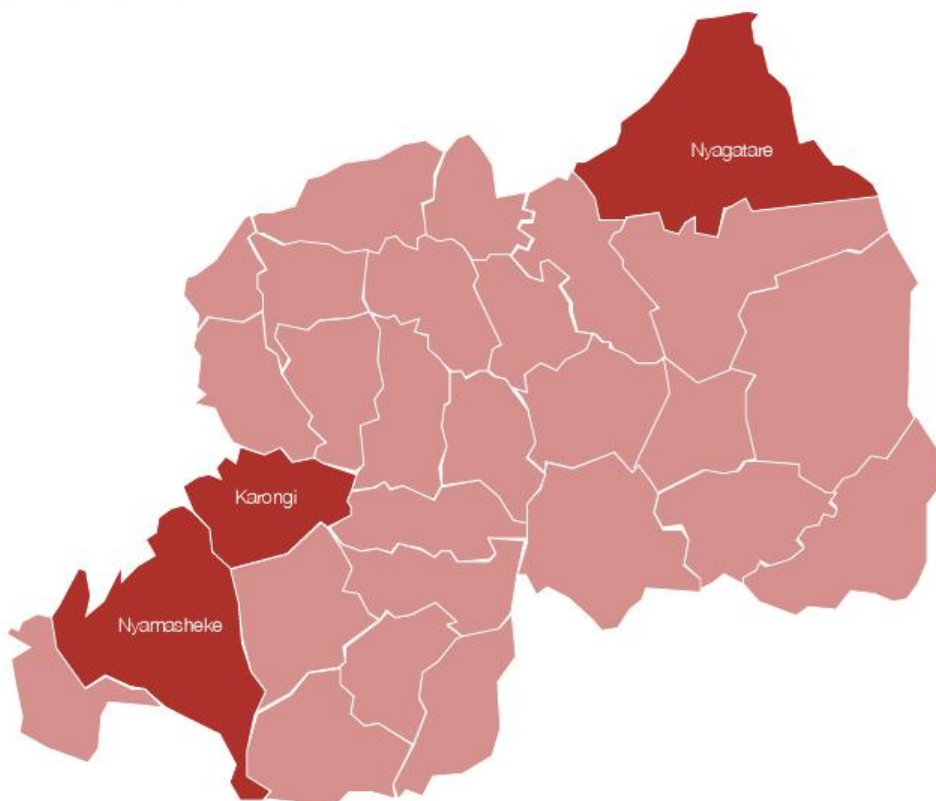
The Action for Social Change goal is to effect a strengthened vibrant, locally rooted civil society in Rwanda which can be a dynamic actor in social, political and economical development processes in areas of formal and non- formal education, livelihood and food security, and health. ASC works with community based groups and cooperatives that are at different levels of development. The strategy of Action for social change is the use of communication as a tool for social change. Through the Action for Social Change ADRA Rwanda has been able to observe and witness social and individual change.

TARGET BENEFICIARIES

550 Community Based Groups and Cooperatives in the operation areas. 16,450 women and 17,016 men.

MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS

- ✓ Awareness raising among CBG members allowed the community to initiate collective actions.
- ✓ KUNDUMURIMO, a basket weaving CBG initiated himself a REFLECT circle which in turn created an active anti-AIDS club which is sensitizing the community on fighting against HIV.
- ✓ Catch up classes helped children to turn up and to follow the primary school program, 28 pupils succeed in the national examination to enter the secondary school. REFLECT circles members initiated themselves REFLECT campaigns for more adult learners, 46 new classes are functioning.
- ✓ A network of 12 HIV CBGs of Twumba and Mutuntu sectors began to organize community campaigns to fight against HIV, more than 100 people already participated in VCT.

SOCIAL INFRASTRUCTURE

Education and Social Infrastructure Construction Project funded by the United Nations High Commission for Refugees

DATE OF OPERATION

January 2013 to December 2013.

GEOGRAPHICAL AREA

Karongi district (Kiziba refugee camp), Nyamagabe district (Kigeme Refugee Camp), Gisagara District (Mugombwa Refugee camp) and Gatsibo District (Nyabiheke Refugee camp).

PROJECT GOAL

To provide physical infrastructure to refugees and hosting community that will enable them the fulfillment of social cohesion and integration through children education and common space sharing.

PROJECT BUDGET

USD 1,566,979

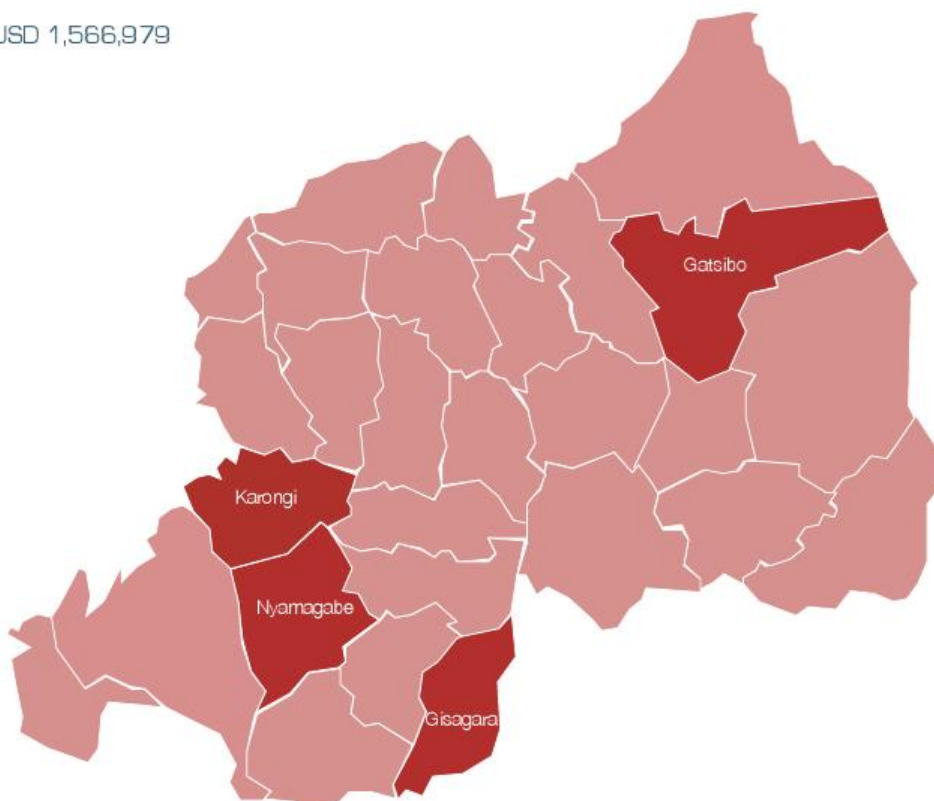
PROJECT SUMMARY

The project was aimed at having good learning infrastructures to accommodate and allow increasing enrollment of the growing population of the school-age refugee children. This project included among others the following activities: Construction of schools in durable materials, as well other social infrastructures like: one-stop centers and police offices for child protection and psychosocial support, which positively would change the life of beneficiaries as the services could be given in safe and sustainable conditions.

These actions enabled children to attend school without facing the adversity of changing weather and also strengthening the security preventing GBV related issues for both refugees and hosting community.

MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS

- ✓ **Mugombwa Refugee Camp:** 49 classrooms, 72 latrines and a One-Stop Centre.
- ✓ **Kigeme Refugee Camp:** Creation of a Child-Friendly-Space, constructed 4 Kitchens, a One-Stop Centre and a Police station.
- ✓ **Nyabiheke Refugee Camp:** 26 Classrooms, 46 latrines.
- ✓ **Kiziba Refugee Camp:** 6 Classrooms.
- ✓ **Nkamira Transit Center:** Rehabilitation of 34 hangars, constructed 7 new hangars, a communal cooking center, supplied 50 bins to be used for garbage collection and sanitation maintenance in the Transit center. Rehabilitated National school classrooms and repaired damaged school desks and black boards that were used during the education orientation session for refugees' children in preparation for National Education system.

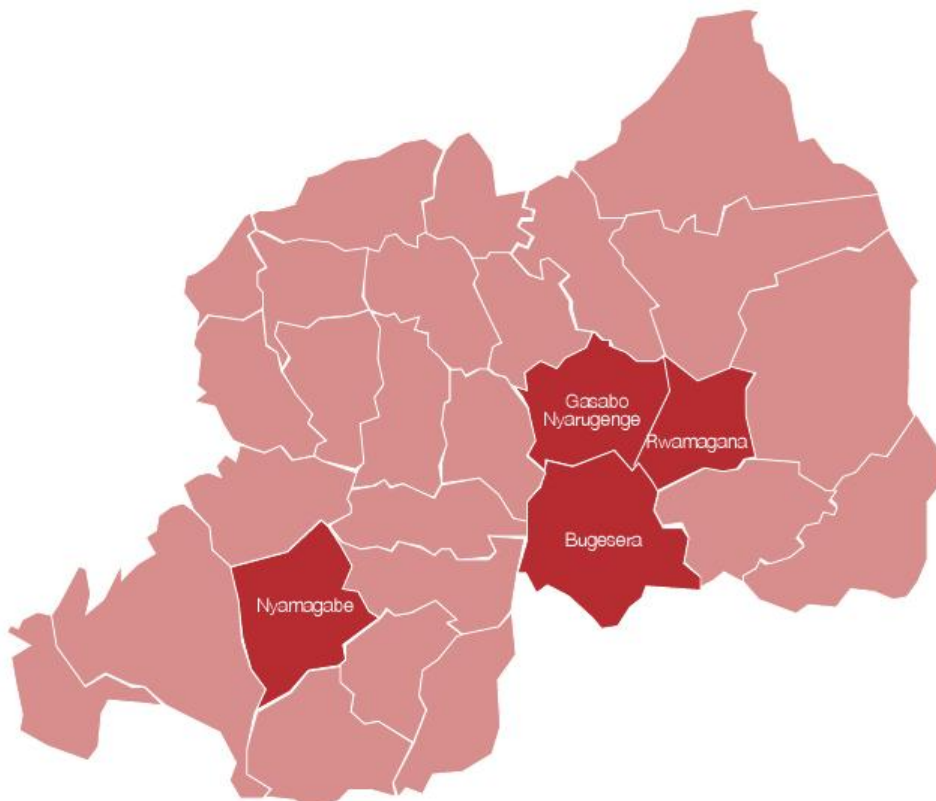

Accelerating Stunting Reduction Amongst Under Two Years in Rwanda -
Embassy of the Kingdom of Netherlands Program funded by UNICEF

DATE OF OPERATION

November 2013 to December 2016.

GEOGRAPHICAL AREA

Gatsibo District in the Eastern Province.

PROGRAM GOAL

To contribute to the reduction of stunting rates of children under-five in Rwanda from 44% in 2010 to 24.5% by 2017 in accordance to the 2013 HSSP III.

PROGRAM BUDGET

USD 1,339,395

PROGRAM SUMMARY

ADRA Rwanda supports the Government of Rwanda's multi-sectoral efforts to fight malnutrition in all sectors of Gatsibo district over a period of 3.2 years starting from November 2013. A total of 13,888 children under the age of two and 17,360 pregnant and lactating women will benefit from the project.

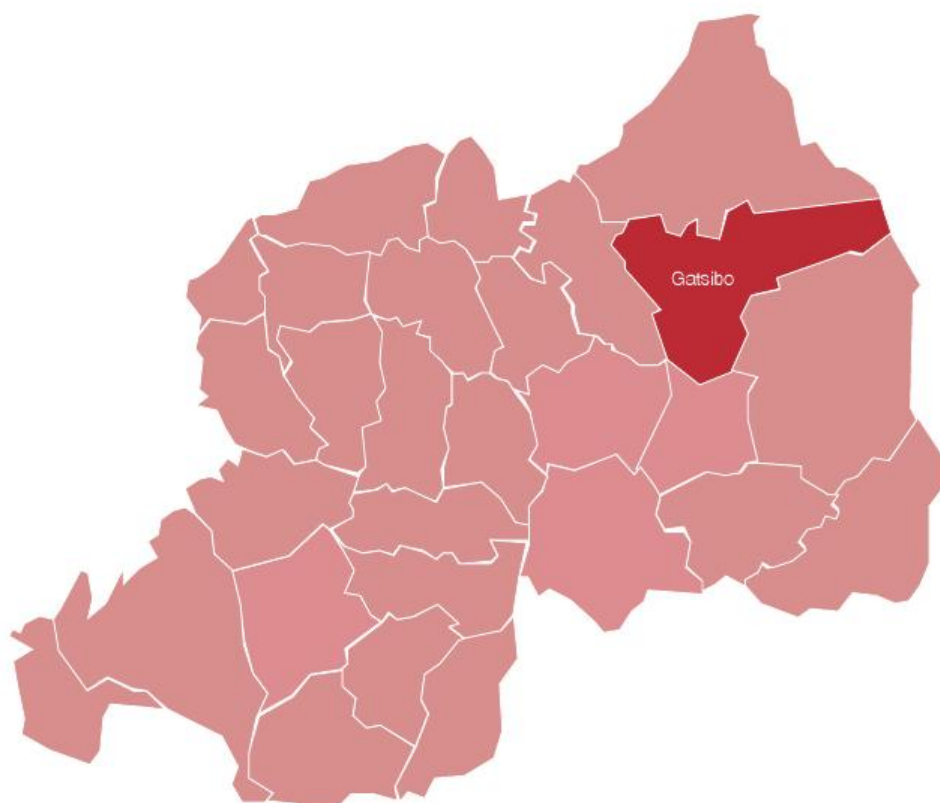
The model the program is promoting aims to provide evidence that an effective combination of interventions can be delivered and brought to scale by government in conjunction with other local stakeholders.

GIFT IN KIND

Gift in Kind books distribution project in partnership with ADRA-International and Shoes distribution in partnership with TOMS Shoes

PROJECT GOAL

This service delivery project takes advantage of In-Kind donors around the world that are interested in contributing with goods to the people of Rwanda. ADRA does not accept used or disposed materials for these types of donations.

ADRA at this point receives English written text books to be used as reference materials in schools and libraries, and new shoes for distribution on schools and for school children, as a strategy to increase school attendance and student self-esteem.,

PROJECT SUMMARY

ADRA Rwanda receives donations from ADRA International of books and education materials, for young readers and young learners. Also through a partnership with TOMS Shoes, ADRA distributed shoes to the most vulnerable students in selected Rwanda schools.

MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS

- ✓ **69,328 books and Educational Materials distributed in 23 schools.**
- ✓ **84,240 pair of TOMS Shoes distributed to 47,825 student girls and 36,415 student boys in 54 schools, four refugee camps and one transit camp.**

30 Districts of Rwanda, 416 Sectors.

PROJECT GOAL

Scaling up HIV/AIDS Response with a focus on prevention.

PROJECT BUDGET

PROJECT SUMMARY

The project aims to reduce sexual transmission of HIV/AIDS through:

Stigma reduction among 33,280 people in 416 sectors. Set up 14,400 condom outlets in 30 districts. And conducting Male circumcision campaigns in 14 prisons targeting at least 32,000 male prisoners.

TARGET BENEFICIARIES

2,500,000 target for the condom outlets beneficiaries only.

MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS

- ✓ Stigma reduction training for 1,200 PLWHAs and OVCs in 5 districts.
- ✓ 1,100 condom outlets set-up.
- ✓ 7,200 prisoners mobilized for circumcision.

Inclusive Refugee Education Management Program - IREMP, funded by the United Nations High Commission for Refugees

DATE OF OPERATION

January 2013 to December 2013.

GEOGRAPHICAL AREA

Kigeme, Gihembe, Nyabiheke, Kiziba, Mugombwa camps and Kigali Urban.

PROJECT GOAL

To provide optimal access to education for school aged refugee children through increasing enrollment, improving retention and completion rates, and enhancing learning outcomes for refugee children in the refugee camps.

PROJECT BUDGET

USD 2,076,104

PROJECT SUMMARY

ADRA Rwanda provides regular education provision, including orientation classes, teacher salaries, transportation, materials and uniforms.

Attention to Inclusive education is given by providing additional trainings on teaching methodology, psychosocial and child protection.

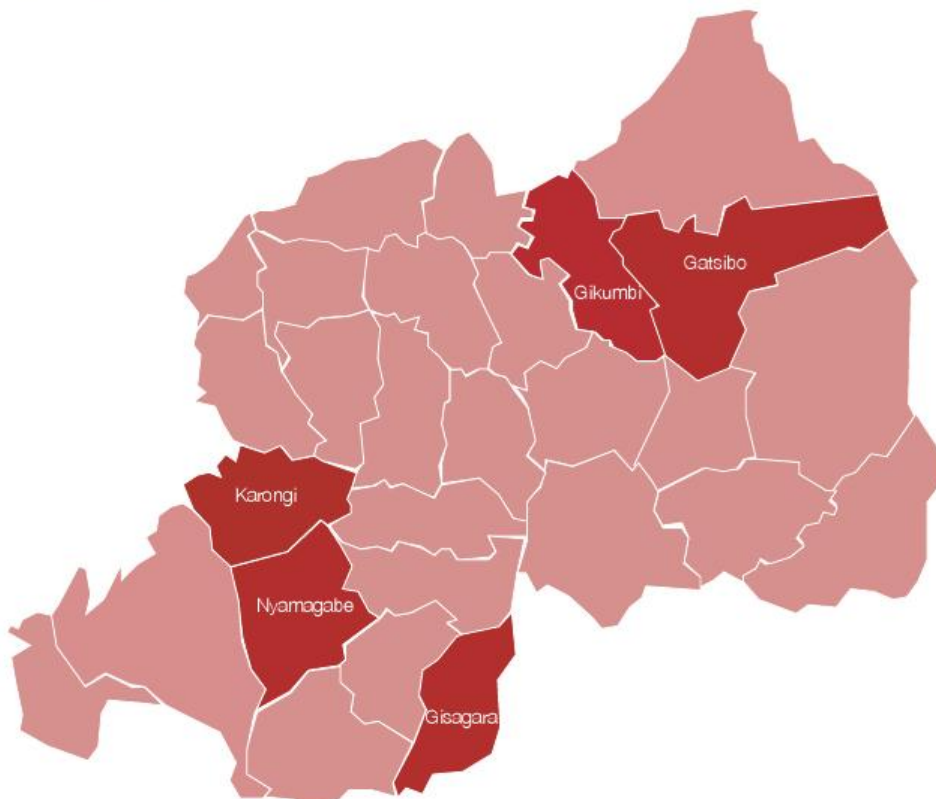
The Inclusive Refugee Education Management Project seeks to improve the education status of refugee camps (Gihembe, Nyabiheke, Kiziba, Kigeme, Mugombwa and Kigali urban); through the delivery of quality education.

TARGET BENEFICIARIES

The targeted beneficiaries are 25,992 refugees.

MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS

- ✓ Enrolled a total number of 18,255 children in primary school and 4,966 children in secondary school.
- ✓ Orientation program done for 3,203 children in primary and 952 children in secondary allowing newly arrived refugees to attend Rwandan Schools.
- ✓ Psychosocial and child protection services provided 187 cases were identified and addressed, 14 sensitization meetings and 5 trainings conducted.
- ✓ Teachers Training in methodology and special needs education.
- ✓ The national examination center at Kiziba camp was approved by the District Education Office for the 2014 examination whereas Kiziba Camp ranked the first performing school in the district of Karongi.

It also uses appropriate technology in education to provide cost effective training in IE methodology at school level and promotes accountability and empowerment through organization of advocacy for Inclusive Education among stakeholders from district to community level.

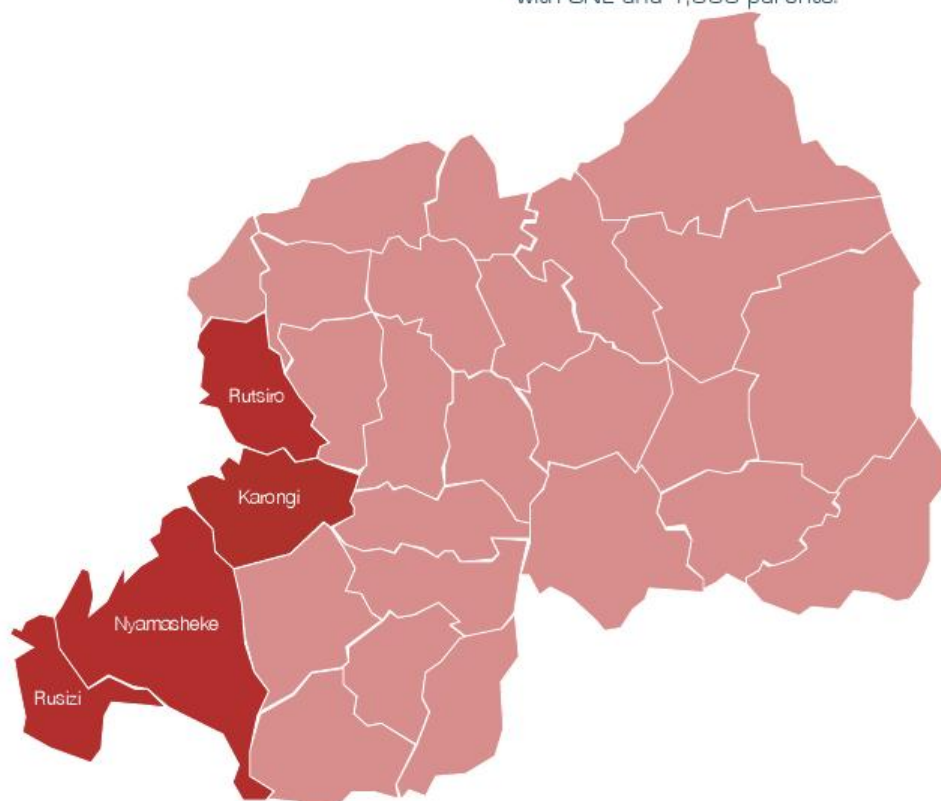

The project provides trainings, start-up inputs in permaculture kitchen gardening with integrated organic

pest management. Also training in water harvesting/saving irrigation, post-harvest techniques, climate change and environment protection including promotion of smokeless improved cooking stoves, and protective agroforestry. Provides tree planting through households and cooperatives, environmental committee capacity building, gender equality, women empowerment, financial management, leadership and literacy training, health and nutrition training.

TARGET BENEFICIARIES

6,080 households (36,480 people).

✓ **1,624 of female and male local trainers trained in organic production, processing and marketing, and integrated pest management.**

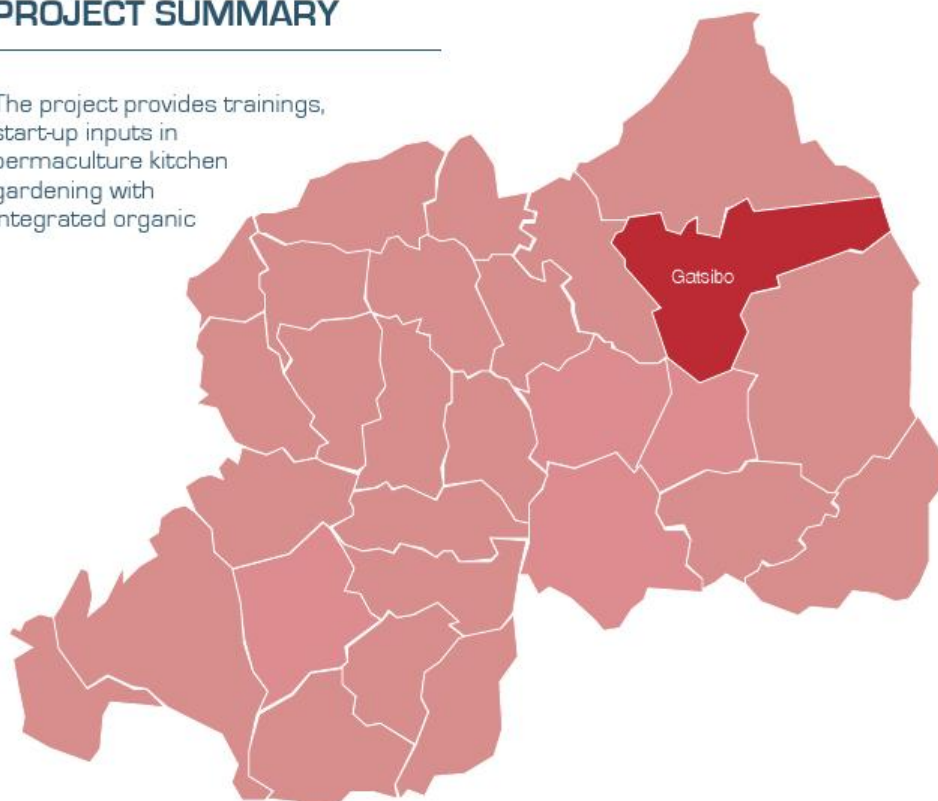

PROJECT GOAL

To maintain the fleet for UNHCR and IPs, manage Central and field Warehouses and fuel control in order to attaining a smooth UNHCR country operation. This includes but not limited to stock management, management and control of fuel, generators' maintenance, servicing and repairing the entire fleet, Emergency response activity planning and implementation,

scheduling transportation and deliveries, management of receipts and dispatches, storage, inventory and periodical stock reconciliations and distributions of food and non-food items (NFIs) in all camps, transit centers and other UNHCR managed refugees and returnees activities.

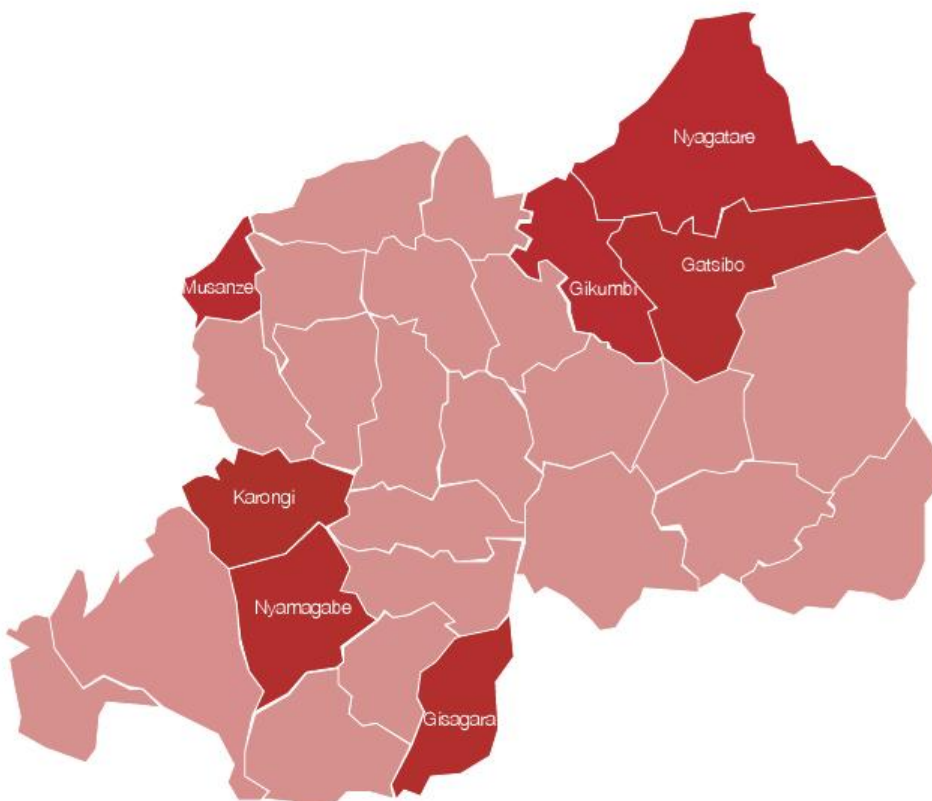

The logistics and supply operations component operates from the UNHCR logistics base in Kigali in the activities of, Warehouse and stores management, fleet management and fuel utilization control, food and non food items' distribution to support all refugee camps and transit centers and also scheduled transportation and deliveries to all required destinations for UNHCR and her implementing partners. ADRA Rwanda participated in all emergency and non emergency field activities and inter-Agency coordination meetings with UNHCR, MIDMAR and IPs, which

facilitated and enabled us to effectively attend to every concern in the supply chain operations of our clients. The project was able to respond to the refugees' service providers' requests regarding the fleet maintenance and supply issues on time and this led to effective and efficiency in delivering services in accordance with the planned activities of our clients.

SUCCESS STORY

A Literacy Class gone Extra Mile

Kabangera Protais, is one of the project-trained instructors in Kayonza District. His learners formed a cooperative early in 2013 with weekly savings of one hundred francs (USD 0,15) that was later increased to one thousand francs (USD 1,50) after realizing the benefits. Having accumulated the savings, they encouraged each member to rear goats with a contribution of one, to the cooperative. During this process the cooperative received an exotic he goat from the project. The he-goat is supporting the cooperative to improve on the local breed to that which is for milk production. In addition, the cooperative charges the community for mating their goats, while members get the service at a reduced cost. This is helping to increase on the cooperative income, which has now reached twenty four thousand francs (USD 35) in three months. This has enabled the cooperative to open a bank account. Furthermore, the members who have gained literacy skills have initiated training in tailoring since the instructor was a tailor. Due to its vigor, the cooperative membership is growing as it has attracted other 12 literate community members. The members are so determined that they have constructed a classroom on their own, equipped it with benches, a table and a sign post has been placed to direct people to classes. The district has visited them and promised to give them sewing machines in support and appreciation of their hard work.

Nutrition Education Changed Me

I am 56 years old, from the Gatsibo district. I am living with HIV AIDS. We are 4 in my family. Nutritional education has improved my life. When I joined Twisungane association, I was very weak, I could not do anything. That time I weighted 46 kg and my white blood cells count [CD4] was 210. I was only seeing death near me. The Community volunteer trained by ADRA Rwanda used to come to my house, counseling me, and slowly I regained hope for the future. She taught me how to prepare a balanced diet and hygiene. I used to think that vegetables are for the poorest without food and I did not know their importance. I could eat beans and bananas or potatoes only and then take one bottle of urwagwa (local beer from banana juice); that was enough for me. In the association I learnt a lot that changed my life. My CD4 improved from 210 to 643 and my life is better. I can work and I now feel stronger than before. I learnt how to grow vegetables, now I have a vegetable garden at home. I have tippy tap that helps me to keep my hands clean. My life has changed completely.

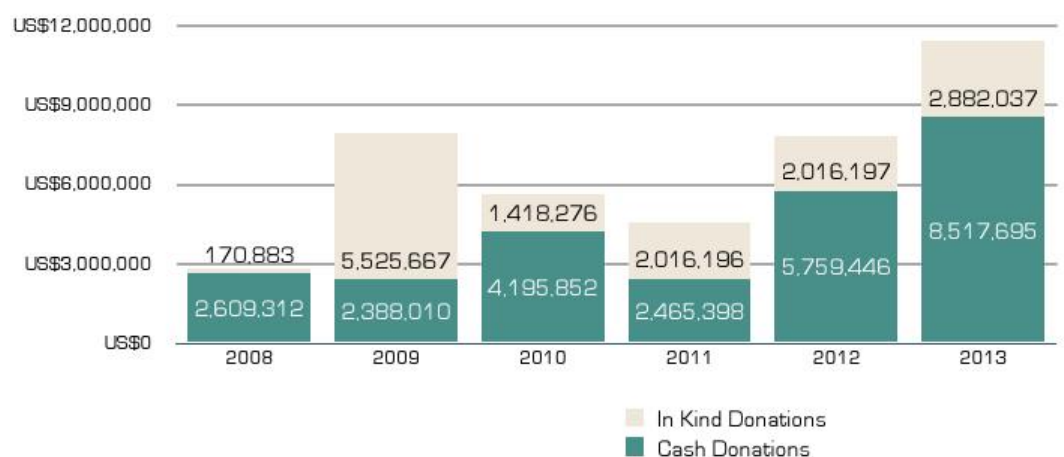
