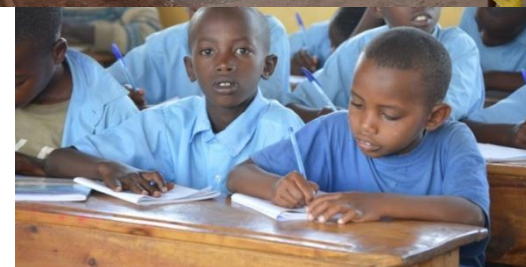

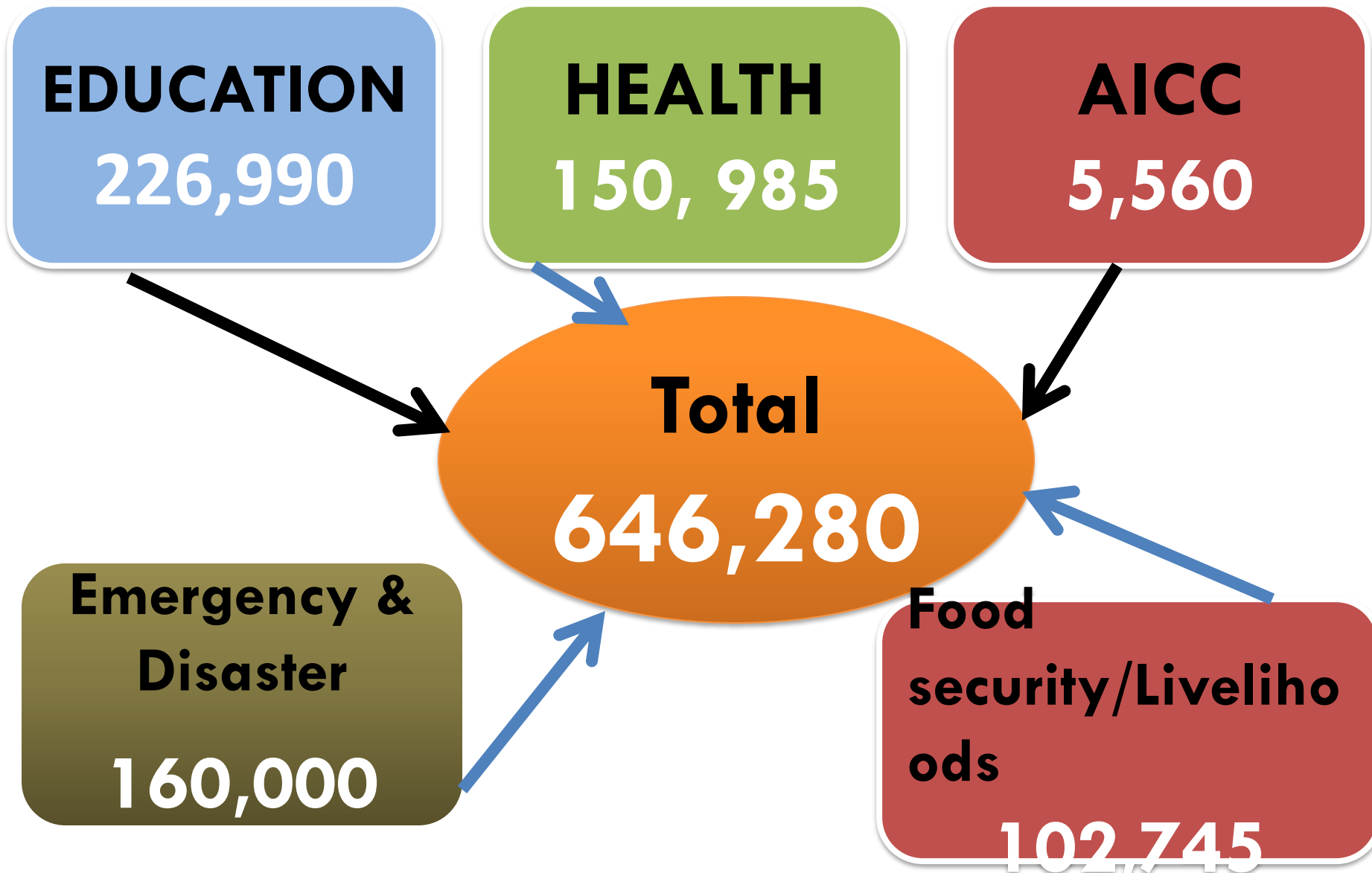

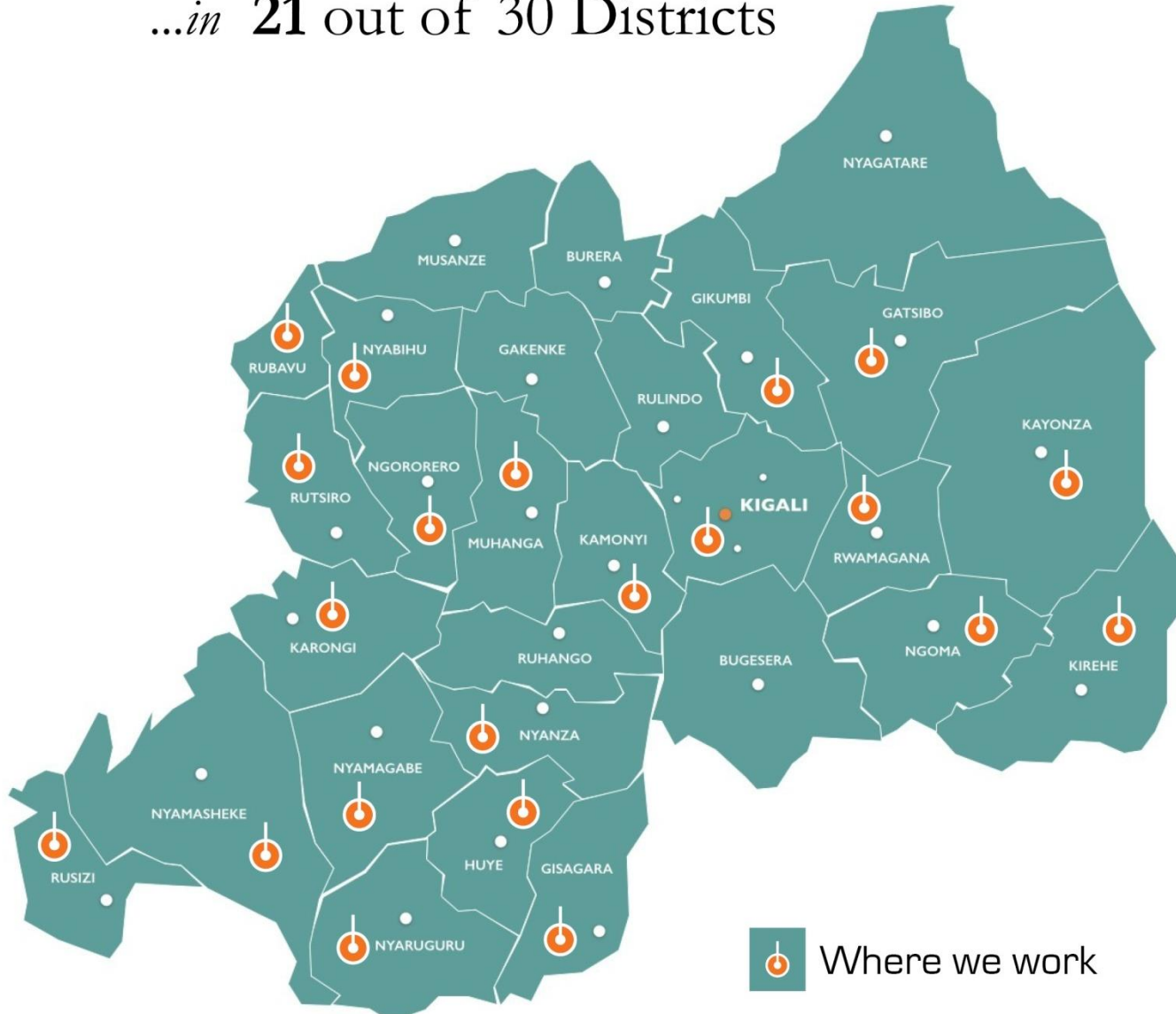

- Rwandan returnees were provided with hot meal



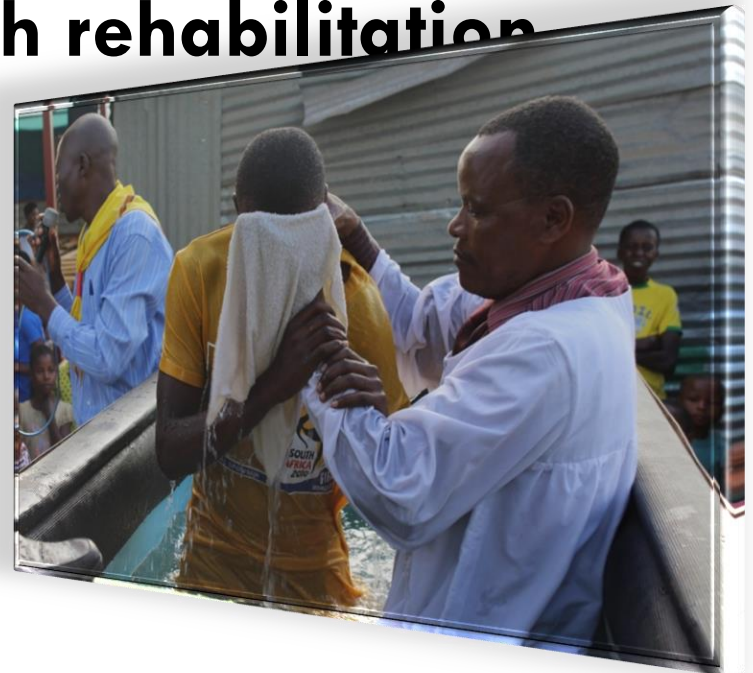

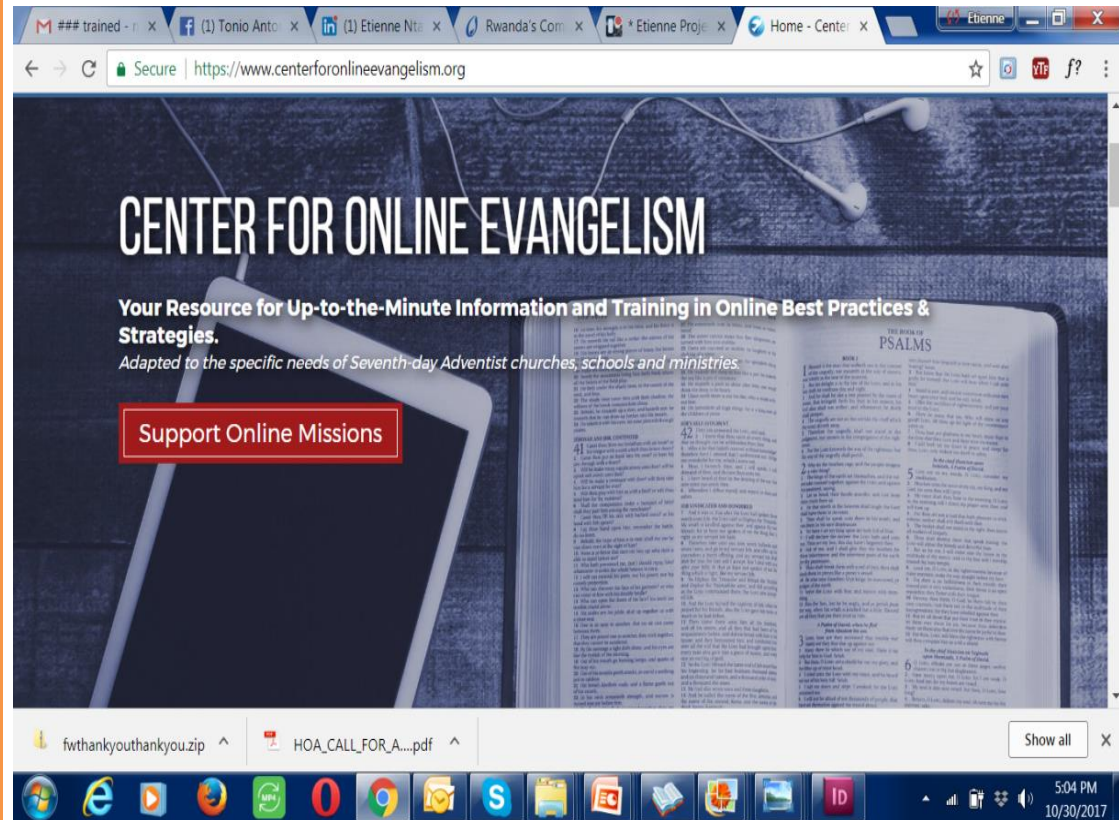

Why is Youth behaviour change critical and urgent?

- The harmful use of alcohol results in **3.3 million deaths** each year
- On average every person in the world aged **15 years** or older drinks **6.2 liters** of pure alcohol per year
- At least **15.3 million** persons have drug use disorders
- Injecting drug use reported in 148 countries, of which 120 report **HIV infection** among this population (source: WHO)

Drug abuse in Africa (source: AFRO WHO)

- **Cannabis** remains the most widely used illicit substance in the African Region
- The highest prevalence and increase in use is being reported in West and Central Africa: **5.2%** and **13.5%**

Drug abuse in Rwanda

- Drug trafficking and abuse was about **23%** of the cases handled by the RNP last year
- **Rwandan youth** are the most affected (those found in possession of cannabis: about **72%** are between the age 18-35)
- Research found that **52% of the youth** have at least used drugs once in their life



Drug abuse in Rwanda cont'd

- **Other crimes** like physical abuse resulting into bodily harm, theft, child molestation and rape **were most of the time directly linked to drug use**
- The RNP encourages **partnership** in crime identification and prevention
